

AN EMPTY CELEBRATION!

Philip always seemed different to his eight-year-old Sunday school classmates. Several weeks before Easter, Philip's teacher told them the story of Jesus' death and resurrection. To make the point about new life, she gave each child a large plastic egg: 'I want you to take this home and bring it back with something inside that shows new life.'

Enthusiastically, the class responded and the eggs were opened as each child explained the meaning of their symbol. In the first egg was a flower; in the next a plastic butterfly, while the third contained green grass. Then the teacher opened the fourth egg; however the egg was empty! 'That's stupid', said one child. Another grumbled, 'Someone didn't do it right!' The teacher felt a tug on his shirt. It was Phillip, who said, 'That's mine, and I did do right! It's empty, because Jesus' tomb was empty.'

He got it right!! The greatest symbol of new life is an empty tomb! 'The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." (Matt. 28:5-7).

Now there are three Empty Promises that we can celebrate this Easter:

An Empty Tomb. Without the empty tomb, we have no Saviour. For those who know Jesus as their Lord, there is no fear in death and we share the assurance of an eternity spent with Jesus and sharing his resurrection life.

An Empty Cross. The promise of an empty cross is that we can stand forgiven of our sins before God. Jesus' cry on the cross 'It is finished!' is a cry of triumph, because the barrier of sin between us and God has finally and eternally been removed. God is with us and working through us.

An Empty Life. This world can only offer transitory satisfaction and security, while the joy of the Lord lasts forever. Our God specialises in filling up the emptiness of this life with his joy, peace forgiveness and new life. Nothing in this world will ultimately satisfy us except Jesus himself.

So Easter reminds us: 'The world gives us promises full of emptiness, but God gives us emptiness full of promise!

INTRODUCING THE NEW BISHOP OF DUDLEY THE RT REVD GRAHAM USHER



The Revd Canon Graham Usher was born in 1970 and spent his early life in Ghana. He was educated at Pocklington School in Yorkshire and then studied for a BSc Ecological Science (Ecology) at Edinburgh University followed by gaining a degree in Theology at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge, whilst training for ordination at Westcott House, Cambridge.

After his ordination in 1996, Graham served his curacy at St Mary's Nunthorpe in the Diocese of York, a large commuter suburb of Middlesbrough with four congregations and a significant amount of youth work. While there, Graham spent time as a Sessional Chaplain at HM Remand Centre at Northallerton, working with young offenders, and became a part-time producer with BBC Radio Cleveland, working on their Sunday religious news programme.

From here Graham moved to be Vicar of Holy Trinity in North Ormesby, Middlesbrough – at that time one of England's 2% most deprived communities, experiencing considerable poverty and social exclusion. A focus on the Church and community led to a growth in the congregation and the development and completion of a flagship community facility, The Trinity Centre, which was awarded HRH The Duke of York's Community Initiative Award.

In 2004, Graham moved to become Rector and Lecturer of Hexham. Hexham Abbey is part of the Greater Churches' Network and, whilst very much a parish church, has some of the outreach and facets found in many cathedrals. Graham worked with the congregation and partners developing a vision for the Abbey and its community and since his appointment the congregation has grown, links with the town and county have significantly increased, and the Abbey has been reunited with its historic monastic buildings which were taken from it at the Reformation. Graham was also Area Dean for five years from 2006.

Alongside his parish responsibilities, Graham is currently a Lay Member of the Governance and Access Committee of the Newcastle Biomedicine Biobank at Newcastle University, where he is involved in ethical discussions about human tissue storage and ensuring consent and dignity. He is also Chairman of the Northeast Forestry and Woodlands Advisory Committee and is a Secretary of State appointee to the Northumberland National Park Authority.

In 2012, Graham's book *Places of Enchantment – Meeting God in Landscapes* was published by SPCK. Graham has also previously been a member of the Scout Movement, including being a national trustee, and has been involved with the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. For a number of years he was a Director of the Bible Reading Fellowship.

Graham is married to Rachel, a GP, and they have two children, Chad age 13 and Olivia age 11. In his spare time he enjoys hill walking, drawing, writing, and the company of friends.

Bishop Graham was consecrated on Tuesday 25th March at St Paul's Cathedral. There will be a welcome service at St Thomas' (Top Church), Dudley, on Saturday 3rd April at 4.00 pm. Bishop Graham will be installed as a Canon of Worcester Cathedral during Evensong on Sunday 4th May at 4.00 pm. You are very welcome to attend these services, but please let me know so that the organisers have an idea of numbers attending.

MOTHERS' UNION

We were pleased to have Stephen with us at our afternoon meeting in March. He had prepared a Lent service in which we reflected on the temptations of Christ in the wilderness, and the temptations of the 21st Century, through readings, prayers and periods of meditation.

Anne and Crispin Ridge told us of the 'Life and Culture of Morocco' at our evening meeting. The North African country of Morocco has Atlantic and Mediterranean coastlines, mountain ranges, desert areas, beautiful architecture and a rich culture. We heard about the villages of mud brick houses and the friendliness of the local people. Anne told us of their visit to Marrakesh with its maze of souks selling vibrantly coloured carpets, leatherwork, ceramics and metalwork. The Majorelle Gardens, at Marrakesh, designed by a French painter, Jacques Majorelle, looked beautiful with their many rare plants and amazing array of cacti.

In 1980 the gardens were bought by Pierre Berge and Yves Saint Laurent who restored them. When Yves Saint Laurent died a few years ago his ashes were scattered there. The Saadian Tombs, just outside Marrakesh, were sealed up for centuries, surrounded by a high wall, before being rediscovered in 1917. These royal tombs have been restored and are magnificently decorated with carvings and surrounded by walls of beautifully coloured tiles. In contrast Anne and Crispin visited Essaouira, on the coast, with its lovely fishing harbour. We were treated to a very interesting insight into Morocco and I thank Anne, Crispin and Stephen (technical support) for an enjoyable evening.

Our Lent Project this year is as in previous years to provide items for the Women's Refuge. Lists of the items needed are on the Mothers' Union noticeboard and there will be a box in the narthex in which to place items during Lent. The Coffee Morning and Collection will be on Saturday 3rd May, 10am - 12noon.

Our evening meeting this month has been moved due to the 3rd Tuesday falling in Holy Week. Corporate Communion will be a week earlier than usual.

LADIES SOCIETY

Local History, by Martin Jones

Martin's talk was based on the history of one house in Sedgley, 'The Limes'. The story began with the Tinsley family, mainly Eliza, who lived there with her husband. They owned other properties in the area one of which was The Leopard, the public house on Moden Hill.

Thomas Tinsley's main source of income however was his nail and chain making business. After his death, the business was carried on by his wife Eliza and it became the largest nail and chain making business company in Staffordshire and by 1861 had 3,000 employees! In 1872 the business was sold, but continued to trade under the name Eliza Tinsley & Co. It is still trading under that name to this day! Eliza died aged 68 in 1882. A William Foster then bought the house but in 1919 he died after throwing himself in front of a train in London!

The Limes was sold again in 1921 and in 1931 it was bought by the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Birmingham who owned it until 1949. It was requisitioned in 1938 in the lead up to the war and it became the headquarters of the A.R.P. and the Auxiliary Fire Service. The 'Observation Tower' was used by Fire Watchers. During the talk, there were many pictures shown on the screen relating to the various stages of The Limes' history. We also saw a picture of a certificate presented to William Cox for the ARP and a photograph of the Sedgley Fire Watchers. After the war the property was acquired by Sedgley UDC and we saw pictures of the interior showing how the various rooms in the basement, ground floor and the first floor were used. Our member Pam Garrington worked there from 1962 to 1964

It was at this point that Martin said how helpful Dudley Archives have been in helping him with his research and recommends that anyone wishing to learn about other local interests or individual people, to go there and they will receive all the help possible. The Limes has now been converted into flats and stands proudly as the focal point amidst a new complex of modern houses and apartments.

Thank you so much Martin for this enlightening talk. It is so interesting to hear about the history of a building that you pass by regularly without giving it a thought! We hope that you might reveal some more of Sedgley's past at some other time.

Our next meeting will be on the 7th April when we will have a talk by our old friend Patricia Boyd, entitled 'Diamond Jubilee' which I know will be interesting and amusing. I hope to see you there.





WHY WE SHOULD BE LIKE DONKEYS

Are you a pet-lover? Many people own a dog, a cat or a budgie, but most of us don't own a donkey! Yet in Bible times, donkeys were essential to daily life. They did everything from helping to grind corn, to ploughing, to carrying people, to transporting their belongings. Despite their small frame, donkeys are surprisingly tough. They are content with poor fodder like thistles, and can travel an average of 20 miles a day.

There are two occasions in the Christian calendar where donkeys walk into the picture. At Christmas, Mary travelled the 100 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. And although a donkey doesn't get a specific mention in the manger story, that same one that transported her was probably there; where else would it have been?

On Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Jesus deliberately chose this animal rather than a horse. Why? In Bible times, the horse was associated with war, conquest and worldly might. But the donkey was a symbol of peace and humility. Jesus used this animal to show that he had come with the dignity of the king of peace. His entry into the Holy City also fulfilled Zechariah's prophecy concerning the Messiah.

Donkeys are hardworking and undemanding. They wait for their master to put them to the work he has chosen for them. And, remarkably, each one bears the mark of the Cross on their backs! Perhaps that is something we should learn; to wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to him, to serve him with all our hearts, and to bear the mark of his grace in our lives.

LAUGH LINES

A small boy wanted a baby brother, so his father suggested he pray every night for one. The boy began to pray earnestly, night after night. When nothing happened, he gave up. After a few months his dad said they were going to see mum in the hospital and he was going to get a big surprise. When they got to the room, the little boy saw his mother holding two babies. "Well, what do you think about having twin brothers?" his dad asked. The little boy thought for a moment and replied: "It is a good thing I stopped praying when I did."

The evangelist Billy Graham tells of a time early in his career when he arrived in a small town to preach a sermon. Wanting to post a letter, he asked a young boy where the post office was. When the boy told him, Billy Graham thanked him and said: "If you'll come to the Baptist church this evening, you can hear me telling everyone how to get to heaven." The boy looked surprised, and finally stammered: "But you don't even know your way to the post office."

BOOK REVIEWS

Was the Tomb Empty? A lawyer weighs the evidence for the resurrection by Graeme Smith, Lion Hudson, £7.99

A highly qualified British judge examines the evidence for the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Assessing secular evidence, historical sources, and the testimony of those involved Graeme Smith carefully and critically analyses the various resurrection accounts, their inconsistencies and their value as evidence.

This succinct but powerful document places less weight on the Gospel accounts and considers other evidence first; sources from outside the gospels, such as Josephus, Tacitus and Pliny; logical alternatives to the resurrection; and the opinions of experts in the fields of history, literary history, palaeography and law. Could this most improbable story be true? If so, what are the implications?

Against the Odds by Carmel Thomason, BRF, £8.99


'As I walked out the door toward the gate that would lead to my freedom, I knew if I didn't leave my bitterness and hatred behind, I'd still be in prison', wrote Nelson Mandela. Why is it that some people can cope with terrible hurt that others inflict on them, while others, take hurt at some slight, and fill up with bitterness and hate? How can attitudes be so different? The answer, suggests this book, lies in the capacity to forgive. Carmel believes that Jesus' teaching on forgiveness is for everyone to practise, not just a chosen few. Here she presents eight true stories demonstrating the healing that can flow through forgiveness.

The testimonies in Part 1 explore the personal face of society's ills – war, crime and terrorism – telling the stories of people who have lost practically everything, whether through war-time imprisonment, rape or the devastation caused by a terrorist bomb. In Part 2 the stories are of everyday forgiveness, asking the reader: 'Are we keeping a record of wrongs?" They include stories of the pain of divorce, of sibling rivalry and of resolving the choice between being right or being loved. All in all, an inspiring book!

Bible Stories for Girls by Christina Goodings and Simona Bursi Lion Children, £8.99 Bible Stories for Boys by Peter Martin and Simona Bursi, Lion Children, £8.99

A collection of eight Bible stories, chosen especially to appeal to girls and boys, respectively. These stories of faith have been retold in a contemporary voice that is easy to relate to. The stories are prefaced with a short introduction encouraging the reader to think about the message contained in each; at the back of the book there is a section that sets the stories in context and shows where to find them in the Bible. The illustrations are sophisticated with a classical feel, but have been given a modern edge.
