She ran the** shop after her mother Elizabeth who had the shop built in the late 1890's. Charity ran the shop with her sister Sarah and my Great Grandad Henry Cartwright known as Harry. My **Great Grandad served in the shop** into his 80's. He had his photo in the Birmingham mail. After his death in 1951 my Great aunt May took over running the shop with her brother Harry and Aunt Sarah. Later on she was helped by my Great aunt Dorothy and various members of the family including my Grandmother **Annie married to Sidney the** youngest brother

My nan also had a cake shop opposite Townsend Ave in 1948.


My aunt Nell use to live in one of those

my name in the sawdust on the floor!


















Upper Brownswall Road

Doreen Ann Cresswell One of the butchers was Gerald who married **Mrs Hunstons daughter Margaret**


Jan Simner I worked for derek Atkins hairdressers first job at the age of 14 friday after school and Saturdays went on to work full time



Carl Higgs I think this is Castle Street before most of it was demolished. My great grandmother Eva Hayward was born here in 1884. The Thomas Darbey School stood on the opposite corner to The Bull, next to the **Congregational Church facing** Bilston Street. The school was built in 1861 at the expense of the Sedgley entrepreneur and benefactor who was a distant relative of the Darby family of Coalbrookdale. He was also the nephew of my 4 x great grandparents Thomas and Rachel Hancox who lived in Coseley. The **St Andrew's United Reformed Church Centre now stands on the** same site, but if you look around the corner into Castle Street, some distinctive Victorian brickwork of the Thomas Darbey School has survived.


