


Vicar's Ponderings - Sept 2017

A few years ago I was listening to a talk by John Bell, a Church of Scotland minister and member of the Iona Community. His talk was at the Christian and arts festival called Greenbelt. Greenbelt, which has happened annually over the past 40 years over the August bank holiday weekend, has for many years been hosted by Cheltenham racecourse, and in the past few years its moved to Boughton Estate, near Kettering. Greenbelt is a mixture of arts, music, talks and seminars, mostly by Christians but also politicians, authors and broadcasters; there is often an edge to the talks, this is not a fluffy Christian festival, it is often very thought provoking and challenging.

The talk I listened to was called "Ten more things they never told me about Jesus", some years ago apparently, Bell did a talk called "Ten things they never told me about Jesus".... So this is a follow on talk!!

The talk is quite diverse in its content, you'll have to go on line if you want to listen to the talk in full, but the part that caught my attention was about the questioning Jesus.

On 60 occasions In Luke's Gospel Jesus asks questions; often when asked a question, Jesus will respond with another question, engaging in conversation, rather than just giving an answer, he gives space for the questioner to think about what the correct response is.

Bell suggests that relationships grow when we respond to questions; we grow in memory, in knowledge and in potential.

As Christians, we often seek answers to our questions directly from the Bibleoften we say, well the Bible says this about about such and such, or that about so and so..... I have, and often still do that, but many of our questions cannot be answered in this way.

Bell suggests that instead of seeking answers to our questions, we should seek what God is asking of us; this can be quite scary, as we may not get the answer we were hoping for, but by seeking what God is asking from us, through prayer and Bible study, we will grow in our potential and in our relationship with God.

I imagine as our new team is completed with Guy being licensed as our new rector, you may have many questions, I imagine one of the biggest questions will be what will happen now, what will change?

Change is inevitable, both Guy and myself are quite different people from the previous rector and team vicar, also the way we have been licensed is different, we are both licensed across the team without specific responsibility for a particular church, this is different to what has happened in the past.

Our vision for the ministry and mission for our parish will also be quite different from before, and this will provoke uncertainty.

As the new ministry team is established and our relationship develops, we will be asking questions of what God is saying to us, as a leadership team, as a parish, and church communities and as individuals.

The most important thing in all this is our relationship with God, and as John Bell points out, that comes first and foremost with prayer and Bible study.

So my question to you is, at the start of the new phase in our parish ministry and mission, what is God asking of us, as an individual, as a church community and as a parish?

Whatever way we need the staff, the Bible assures us that our Good Shepherd will take good care of us. As long as we are following Him, nothing can get at us without first coming past Him.

THE WAY I SEE IT: The Blame Game Canon David Winter

'It's her fault!' That, along with 'it's not fair!' is among the first sentences most children learn. Something's been broken, someone's in tears, and the Blame Game has begun. The awful truth is, we don't grow out of it. Look at any newspaper or watch daytime television and you'll see it played out endlessly.

Years ago, a battle-hardened journalist told me that 'in news there are no accidents'. Of course, in fact there are. But after every well-publicised incident the media and aggrieved parties ensure that the endless hunt for someone – anyone – to blame and punish goes on, even if it takes years.

When the tower in Siloam fell, the crowds didn't ask Jesus who was to blame (they simply assumed it was an 'act of God'). They wanted to know if the 18 victims were particular sinners, to suffer such a fate. No, he said, they weren't – though they should all amend their ways. The crowd weren't concerned with blame, but consequence. It sometimes seems we've reversed that, in the modern world, and replaced consequence with blame. Somehow it will all be better if someone is punished – or is made to pay heavy compensation.

Every time we say the Lord's Prayer we ask for forgiveness, but add 'as we forgive those who sin against us'. It may well be their fault, but we are not seeking a penalty for it. That seems a healthy, if radical, alternative to the Blame Game.



Why do Christians pray?

Jesus taught his followers to talk to God in the same way that He did – like a child speaks to an adoring father. When they pray, Christians sense that they are in the presence of God. They are seeking to come close to the maker and shaper of the world's destiny. Christians lay open to God their deepest hope, happiness and anxiety. And they open themselves to God directing and changing them.

Those who take prayer to heart do not see it simply as a series of requests that God will change the world in the way they personally want. Rather it is an active way of participating in the working out of God's plan for the world. Prayer can involve words, silence, reading, responding to art, or listening.

Christians look for answers to their prayers in a change to their own actions and attitudes, and are overjoyed when the result is something that they recognise to be a miraculous intervention by God.

But despite that, God undoubtedly registers and responds in some way to all kinds of prayer – even the desperate cry in an emergency of someone who has barely even thought about whether He exists.

A conversation with God of this kind takes many forms:

Praising This involves a human being putting himself or herself in a place of appropriate humility in front of the God who is utterly holy, loving and just.

Thanking This is a way of recognising that everything that gives value or joy to life is the gift of a Creator, not merely good fortune.

Asking Prayers of this kind can be personal (such as begging for healing for a sick relative) or immense in scale (such as longing for the end of a war).

Seeking forgiveness This involves confession of something wrong (either personal or as part of a worldwide injustice) and a recognition that God has mercy on those who regret what they have done and seek to change.

Looking for guidance Prayer frequently asks God for direction, or seeks understanding in the face of the mysteries involved in being alive.

The Coseley Tragedy

Told by Anne Clarke.

'We had a very dramatic beginning to this talk, as a lady dressed in early 20th century garb came rushing into the room shouting "I've put my children into the canal"

Anne who is a descendant of the family concerned first became interested after reading names in her Gran's hymn book, she asked who they all were but her Gran was not interested, so she went to the 'Dudley Archives' and began delving into the past! The 'Tragedy' took place on June 14th 1901, when the lady dashed into the Police Station with the above message. I am not sure what the actual relationship with Anne is, but it was certainly interesting.

The cause for the event was about poverty. At that time the 'Working Class' were lucky if they could get a job and if they did work they were very poorly paid for long hours and heavy work. The men in desperation tended to drink a lot, so not much, so not much money was given to the wives, they were usually quite large families! Anne's ancestor's name was Hanna Cox and suddenly she decided she had had enough! She took (I think it was two) of her children for a walk by the canal and then put them into the water and drowned them! She then ran to Police Station and told the police what she had done!

Naturally she was arrested. The inquest was held on June 16th and she was found guilty and sent to Broadmoor. Her friends and neighbours got together and collected money to pay for the prosecution. She was eventually released from Broadmoor in 1906.

Philip Cox, also one Anne's ancestors was known locally as "King of the Gamblers".

He was chased by his debtors and eventually went to America, he took three of his children with him, his brother France Cox sent him some money. He died in 1936 aged 63.

Well! what a story. Thank you Anne you kept us all enthralled, and it was so interesting because it happened so close to us.

Finally it was a shame our June meeting was cancelled at such short notice. The Proprietors of Baggeridge had spent a long time preparing everything for us. Geraldine had been helping and she said that they must have lost a lot of money as all the fresh food such as salads, bread etc would have to be thrown away. She felt so sorry for them, so she organised a collection from us, to help reduce their losses. I think that was a lovely gesture from Geraldine and I'm sure it was appreciated, here's hoping for better luck next time.

WWITIMELINE - EVENTS OF 1917

August 1917

- 15th Battle of Hill 77 (Lens) begins (ends 25th August).
- 16th Battle of Langemarck (Ypres) begins (ends 18th).
- 17th Eleventh Battle of Isonzo begins (ends Sept 12th).
- 20th "Second Offensive Battle" of Verdun begins.

September 1917

- 2nd First German aeroplane raid on England by moonlight by more than one plane.
- 3rd Severe aeroplane raid on Kent by moonlight (about 230 casualties, mostly military).
- 4th German planes raid London for the first time at night. German submarine bombs Scarborough.
- IIth First party of Britsh prisoners reaches England from Switzer land.
- 20th Battle of Menin Road Ridge (Ypres) begins (ends 25th).
- 26th Battle of Polygon Wood, (Ypres) begins (ends Oct 3rd).
- 28th Action of Ramadi (Mesopotamia) (28 & 29th).

Battle of Pilchkem Ridge.

General Haig believed the German Army was weak and wouldn't withstand an attempted breakthrough in the north-east of the Ypres Salient. It would enable the British to possess the dominant views of the high ground of the Passchendaele Ridge, and would they be in a good position to continue the push to the German held ports of Ostend and Zeebrugge, hampering their supply lines.

The first bombardment before the battle lasted ten days: 3,000 guns fired 4.25 million artillery shells.

4.45a.m. on 16 August, 1917

Allied forces attack at Langemarck. Amongst the troops is **Private** Harry Patch of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry.

He survives the battle but a month later is wounded by shell shrapnel when three of his Lewis machine gun-team are killed. He returns to Britain and is convalescing when the war ends. He goes on to become the last British survivor of the trenches.

Patch refused to talk about his war experiences until he reached the age of 100, and his forthright views on the war and its futility made him a popular figure and focus of much attention. He once said "War isn't worth one life". He died in 2009, aged 111.
