On Easter Monday, 24th April 1916, a group of Irish nationalists staged a rebellion against the occupying British Government in an attempt to establish an Irish Republic.

Forces were sent from Britain to suppress the rebels, including newly recruited troops from the 2/6th South Staffordshire Regiment. On Friday 28th April, they entered North King Street and after fierce fighting, began clearing the area house by house, killing fifteen unarmed male civilians. It was one of the bloodiest incidents during Easter Week. By Saturday 11 men from the regiment had been killed and 28 wounded.
