Dear friends,

Well who, back in January 2020, would have predicted the year we have had, with the impact of living through a pandemic?

So many plans cancelled or re-arranged. Each of us will have different experiences, depending on our circumstances.

Many, like me, have had to cancel holidays. Sadly, many weddings and

baptisms have had to be rearranged. Family get-togethers have been cancelled or limited in numbers, birthdays, wedding anniversaries, the list I'm sure goes on.

We have had to be adaptable with our church services, what we had planned had to be quickly changed, and most of us having to learn how to use Zoom, who could have anticipated that?!

Mistletoe

This time of year you can see all sorts of traditions played out with regard to Christmas decorations. Strict adherents use holly, ivy and of course, mistletoe. While holly and ivy are to be found in gardens and hedgerows, mistletoe usually only appears in greengrocers' shops, or high in a tree well out of reach.

Mistletoe is *hemiparasitic*, meaning that although its leaves enable it to feed itself through photosynthesis, its roots invade the host tree or shrub to extract water and other nutrients. Its favourite host trees are apple, lime, hawthorn, poplar or oak and it normally hangs as a large globe, tantalisingly high and totally visible once winter arrives and it is the only green left on the tree. There are some spectacular examples in Windsor Great Park, clearly visible from the path on the opposite side of the River Thames.

We all know about the almost translucent white berries, fleshy and sticky, which form in the forks of mistletoe's many branches. While they are toxic to humans, they are attractive to birds. When birds have enjoyed the juicy flesh, they wipe the remaining seeds off their beaks onto the nearest branch [somewhat like small children wiping sticky hands on any surface close by — mummy's face or clothes?]. With luck the seed remains stuck to the bark and solves mistletoe's problem of reproduction.

In Greek mythology, mistletoe gave access to the Underworld. Romans thought it represented Peace, Love and Understanding and perhaps that is how it has sidled into our Christmas celebrations. The earliest documentary evidence for kissing under mistletoe dates from the sixteenth century. Some people think a berry should be removed after each kiss. Given the small size of pieces generally available these days, perhaps that is a practice not to be pursued!

One of the people who migrated to Sedgley

After an enquiry from a relative concerning the location of his grandfather's grave, I found out quite a lot about one of the burials in what used to be Sedgley's main cemetery from 1870-1960 - **Gospel End Street Graveyard,** using Ancestry and Forces' War Records.

Hubert William Hobbs and his wife **Jane** were typical of the migration of agricultural workers from Worcestershire and Shropshire farms to the Black Country in the 19th and early 20th centuries, to work in the coal, brick and metal industries.

He was born 'William Hubert Hobbs' in Winchcombe, Gloucestershire in 1878.

In 1900, he married Jane Chad at the Parish Church in Stoke Prior, Bromsgrove, Worcestershire.

By 1901, he was working as a 'carter', on Hill Farm in Oxenton, Gloucestershire; in 1911 he had moved to Neen Savage, just north of Cleobury Mortimer in Shropshire and was working as a 'waggoner'. The trades are similar and would have involved the care and maintenance of horses. At that point he had five children, including a son, Cecil, born in around 1908.

Shortly afterwards, however, he must have moved his family to 6, Gospel End Road, to work at the Earl of Dudley's Baggeridge Coal Mine in Gospel End Village.

At this point the First World War intervened. He joined (or was conscripted into) the British Army in 1916, serving till December 1918, when he was discharged to continue his employment at Baggeridge. His discharge papers listed eight children.

By 1939 he was living at 7, Penn Lane, Gospel End, near Nashes Coppice Farm and Gospel End Farm, both owned by members of the Pugh family. At the age of 61 he seems he had reverted to his original career, looking

after the horses on those farms.

When he died, his address was 27 North Oval, Upper Gornal. He died aged 82 on 27th December 1960 at 10 Burton Road (Burton Road Hospital). His grandson Derek recalls visiting him there as a child. Hubert's wife Jane had died in 1958 and is buried with him.

Alas Hubert and Jane's gravestone and the surrounding area are completely overgrown now, but its location reference, along with its inscription were recorded when a major survey of the graveyard took place in the 1980s.

To understand and believe the truth of the Incarnation will not only transform your idea of Christmas—it will change your life now and your everlasting destiny.

The sycamore leaf was chosen as it symbolises, strength, protection, eternity, and clarity. The steel was chosen to remind us of our resilience and collective strength. Each leaf has the word HOPE on it. Due to the lockdown the exhibition had to be cut short but the cathedral are hoping to bring it back again next year. It will move around the country and as the steel leaves age they will rust and change colour.

This wonderful artwork started me thinking about the word HOPE. The dictionary definition states that HOPE is 'a feeling of expectation. A desire for a particular thing to happen. Believing that something good may happen.'

My Grandmother lived on HOPE Street, a place, like so many others, where there was a close community, the door was always open, and people helped each other. This caring for neighbours and friends has come to the fore during this pandemic.

I can remember the comedian Bob HOPE who made us laugh. In these times we need to have times of laughter to release the anxieties we are often feel.

The birth of Jesus was a beacon of HOPE in the world. As we celebrate Christmas, in these unprecedented times, we remember that the HOPE Christ brings is just as powerful today as it was 2000 years ago.






