Pentecost Sermon by Bishop Martin

Come Holy Spirit be our guest, and may this time by you be blessed. I like that prayer. It's simple and easy to remember. I like it too because it is a prayer that does something. It says, Come Holy Spirit. It invites God the Holy Spirit to come amongst us with all the Spirit's power and all the Spirit's gentleness. Come Holy Spirit be our guest.

We invite God the Holy Spirit to do what guests do: disrupt our lives, share our table, open our minds to new possibilities and touch our hearts. Come Holy Spirit be our guest, and may this time, this prayer service, this meal, this bible study... by you be blessed.

50 Days after Easter is the Feast of Pentecost or Whit Sunday, Spirit Sunday. That was the day the Spirit came upon the first disciples in Jerusalem. They had been told by Jesus to wait, and this was what they had been waiting for.

Its sometimes called the birthday of the church, because that's when this ramshackle group were clothed with power from on high. The Holy Spirit had come and the first sign of this was their speaking in tongues, in languages that spoke direct to the heart of passing people, who were amazed that they understood what was being said.

That's just one of the many gifts the Spirit brings. The gift of true communication, when heart speaks to heart. As people hear that God is real, that God loves them. That Jesus is alive and here with us now, and the promise that everyone who calls upon his name will be saved... can be made one with him.

A simple prayer you may want to use this Pentecost, if you dare! Come Holy Spirit be my guest, and may my life by you be blessed. Amen.

Questions:

• We are told the Spirit of truth will lead us into all truth. Before you read a bible passage, ask the Holy Spirit to open your mind and your heart to the mystery of his Word. Ask the Holy Spirit to reveal the word that is good news (gospel) for you.

- Have you ever experienced God the Holy Spirit? How did it feel?
- Have you ever prayed a prayer like this? If not, why not give it a try?

Jesus Stills the Storm (Matthew 8. 23-27)

²³ And when he got into the boat, his disciples followed him. ²⁴ A gale arose on the lake, so great that the boat was being swamped by the waves; but he was asleep. ²⁵ And they went and woke him up, saying, 'Lord, save us! We are perishing!' ²⁶ And he said to them, 'Why are you afraid, you of little faith?' Then he got up and rebuked the winds and the sea; and there was a dead calm. ²⁷ They were amazed, saying, 'What sort of man is this, that even the winds and the sea obey him?'

Last year at this time I wrote that we were 'in a very real storm created by the Coronavirus and the illness it leads to, Covid-19'.

Although the vaccine has given us a renewed hope for the future in the UK, India and other countries are really struggling – struggling in ways that we were afraid might happen to us in the UK last year. Though some countries are in a much stronger position than last year, the real risk of the virus is still with us in the world.

And for many of us there is still a horrible anxiety and even fear. Many of us have felt a real impact on our mental health. Our cry may be the same as the disciples in the boat, 'Lord, save us! We are perishing! As you read the scripture above again notice that Jesus was always in the boat with the disciples and he is with you and me now, whatever our own situation.

The disciples called on Jesus and woke him up. Jesus knew that they were not perishing, not least of all because he was with them. But he responded to them and rebuked the winds and the sea; and there was a dead calm. In the quiet of your heart continue to hold onto Jesus and call on His name and know he is with you and hears your prayers. Let Him calm your fears.

From the feast day of Mother Julian of Norwich: "In his love God wraps us and holds us. He enfolds us for love and will never let us go. " Remember His love is in the midst of life and know that all will be well; all manner of things will be well.

When I want to still myself and be calm and quiet, I often use a very ancient and simple prayer, the Jesus Prayer, repeated over and over:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner.

May God bless you and give you his peace in the challenges we face as we slowly unlock the lockdown. Remember we are not alone. Please be assured of my prayers for you and please remember those nations of the world currently in the midst a Covid-19 storm.

Living in Love and Faith

"There is no fear in Love, but perfect love casts out fear"-1 John 4:18

In February 2017, General Synod of the Church of England debated the report "Marriage and Same Sex Relationships after the Shared Conversations (GS2055)". The report was debated but not voted on. Later, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York agreed that "we need a radical new Christian inclusion in the Church. Founded on Scripture, reason, tradition, theology, and Christian faith as the CofE has received it; it must be based on good and flourishing relationships, in a proper twenty-first century understanding of being human and of being sexual".

As a consequence of this quest, a team of people including theologians, church ministers, Bishops, lay people, people of differing sexual orientations, differing church traditions and theological convictions and life experiences came together to look at the differing aspects of human identity, relationships, sexuality and marriage.

The fruit of their labour is the Living in Love and Faith (LLF) resources. As church communities, we are being asked to engage with the material; and there are a lot of resources to engage with!! From 6 week courses, a beefy book to read (which is also available on line to read so you don't have to buy a copy!), there are films, podcast, interviews etc.

The material has been produced in a way that we can all engage with the material well, with humility, grace, learning, repentance and healing. Sadly the "Church" has caused damage and hurt too many, especially the LBGTI+ community.

Engaging with the process will be a journey of understanding for all of us, in many different ways, we will all have own views and convictions, but learning together, may help us to a new understanding of what it means to be human and a follower of Jesus. We hope to be able to offer engagement, for the parish community, with the material during the year, so watch this space!

The Parable of the Great Banquet

One thing that we've probably missed over the past year is parties. Well, this month should enable us to party again! Lots of Jesus' parables focus on parties, as they are a picture of the joy, hope and life of the kingdom of God. The parable of the Great Banquet (Luke 14: 15-24) challenges us not to miss out on this.

In Jesus' day, when people accepted an *invitation* to a banquet, they were only told the actual time on the day: 'Come, for everything is now ready' (17). Jesus' invites each one of us to share in the life of His kingdom.

However, the guests made excuses for not coming. At the time, this would have been extremely insulting to the host. They said: 'I have just bought a field; I must try out my new team of oxen; I have just got married' (18-20). These are all good things in themselves, however they reveal their priorities were elsewhere.

We too can be pre-occupied with our own routines of work, family, retirement, holidays, friends, home, social media, that we forget God's priorities for our lives. Jesus calls for total commitment from His disciples. What priority in my life is holding me back from accepting His invitation? How did the host respond? He ordered His servants to 'Go out quickly into the streets and alleys of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame.' (21). He invited the unexpected and unacceptable people to His banquet. Jesus makes the point that God's kingdom is open to all! Thinking about our family, friends, colleagues and neighbours, even if they're not like us or show little interest in God: Are we willing to offer them God's invitation to share His love and life?

Where are our birds?

British birds are in big trouble. 80 per cent of our most popular species are in severe decline, according to recent data from the RSPB's annual Big Garden Birdwatch.

The world's largest wildlife survey has found that 16 out of the 20 most spotted garden birds have been in decline since 2020. There are now concerns about the greenfinch and chaffinch, which were seen in their lowest ever numbers this year.

The top five birds seen in people's gardens were: house sparrows, blue tits, starlings, blackbirds and wood pigeons. Only robins, blackbirds, carrion crows and the song thrush grew in number in 2020.

All Saints Snapshots of History – Part One

The East Window

How often do you take for granted the East Window – the dominant and magnificent feature as you enter church, particularly on a sunny morning as the rising sun illuminates the stained glass?

Reference to a report in the Wolverhampton Chronicle, 6th July 1831, gives an interesting description of the window:

'The East Window was installed in 1831 (the Church was rebuilt 1826 – 1829). The upper part contains the armorial bearings of the Earl of Dudley and those of the Vicar and other families connected with the parish; the lower representations are of Christ and some of the Apostles and Evangelists. The window was executed in Nuremberg by J Helmle. The colours are brilliant and the figures perfect and the disposition of the drapery produces the best effect.'

In 1866 the window was "restored to its original beauty".

And so it remained until 1969 when part of the window was replaced – the tracery and armorials remaining. This work being undertaken by D Brooke. The plaque adjacent to the southern end of the altar rail indicates in memoriam of those involved.

The window was re-dedicated on November 7th 1971.

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A Pembrokeshire Spring

After the winter that has seemed so hard and so long, what a joy it has been to escape to our little haven of peace in Pembrokeshire! At home there is such a temptation to either be doing jobs or feeling guilty about not doing them. Here there are fewer jobs, and somehow it's easier to ignore some of them in favour of cutting out paper dolls with the little ones.

The sunny weather has been an absolute joy, painting the world in beautiful spring greens, filtering the light in such a way that the leaves glow between the branches. Hedgerows are full. Dandelions and daisies may be humble little plants, but they nestle amongst the grass with their bright colours beautiful amongst the green. Throw in the subtler tones of primrose and primula, tiny violets and forget me nots, set them against a soundtrack of birdsong, and you find yourself humming "All things bright and beautiful" We only spotted one clump of anemones, but we were once told that these were the flowers referred to in one of our favourite biblical quotations "Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow. They toil not, neither do they spin, but yet I say unto you that even Solomon in all his glory was nor arrayed like one of these."

So does that mean we shouldn't always be worrying about the jobs we haven't done? We think it does, don't you?

Friend?

Making changes

They also failed to show any loyalty to the family of Jerub-Baal (that is, Gideon) in spite of all the good things he had done for them. Judges 8:35

There are some things we change often and others rarely. All businesses want customers and clients who return again and again, without making a fuss and who do not 'shop around'. Do you 'shop around' or are you steadfastly loyal, whether you are valued or not?

Take a minute to think about how loyal you are to your supermarket, bank, doctor, insurer or energy supplier. Some of these we change often without a thought, and some not so. Many of us are skilled at getting the best deal and haggling. There is nothing wrong with that, and we should certainly be good stewards of what we have. This applies to both our home and church. We should shop around to get the best offer for our families or the congregation. When was the last time your church got several quotes for electricity or insurance?

If you think about the list above, there are some things we would rarely change. We tend to keep the same bank, and the same usually applies to doctors and other professionals. Some of these are simply not easy to change! Banks are supposed to make it easy to change accounts, but it rarely is. We would not give a second thought to doing the week's shop somewhere different, but business likes customers who are loyal, so they introduce reward schemes to encourage us to always buy things from them. All businesses depend on reputation and loyalty is to be valued. If we get a good experience, we should cherish it. If not, then tell them. What should we look for when shopping around? How about asking yourself the following questions: 'Is it *really* a good deal?' 'Are there hidden extra charges?' 'How long are you tied into the deal for?' 'How difficult will it be to change supplier?'

If you want to renew a contract or if you are a new customer, it is usually easy. But try to cancel and they make it difficult; you often have to telephone to explain why. If you say you do not want to renew because you have a better quotation elsewhere, then you may suddenly get a better deal.

We do not usually have loyalty cards or reward points in church, do we! We could probably learn something about welcoming new customers and keeping existing ones loyal.

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Makes one loaf 225g self raising flour 100g butter 150g castor sugar 450g bananas – over ripe 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 eggs 175g mixed dried fruit

Preheat oven to 180 degrees Peel and mash bananas and mix all ingredients except dried fruit together, this can be done in a food processor or by hand. When all mixed up add the dried fruit. Spoon the mixture into a 1kg non stick loaf tin, spread out evenly and bake for 1.5 hours.

The loaf is cooked when a skewer pushed into the middle comes out clean.

Belief

Our elderly vicar was very devout, but sometimes lost his place during the service. One Sunday as we reached the Creed there was a long silence, so the curate went across to him and gently touched his arm. "I believe in God," she whispered.

The vicar smiled back happily."Oh so do l, so do l!"

How healthy is your church leader – and your church?

When was the last time you heard a church leader preach about sleep? Or about eating well, exercise, coping with stress or living a life rich with relationships?

How far do your church leaders model good health and wellbeing in the way the church is run and the example they set for the congregation? And how often do they teach about living well?

These questions are posed by experienced general practitioner and Christian, Dr Richard Pile, in a newly-published book that aims to bridge the gap between health and faith.

In *Fit for Purpose*, (HarperInspire), he declares: "I believe for us to feel truly well, to fulfil our potential and live satisfying and meaningful lives, there should not be an artificial divide between physical and mental and spiritual wellbeing."

He calls on church leaders to take seriously the health of their congregations and the people they seek to serve. They should create a culture where living well – "life in all its fulness" – is encouraged and modelled.

"If someone tells me that they have lots of spiritual gifts – such as prophecy, discernment or speaking in tongues – but their physical and mental health, their relationships, their career or finances are a disaster, I would question whether they truly understand what wellbeing really means, and whether they've got the balance right."

Richard Pile sets out what the Bible says about sleep, food, exercise, coping with stress, having strong social connections and living with meaning, and then challenges the Church to take these teachings seriously. He believes this could have a positive impact on a church's influence in its community.

He says, "Crowds followed Jesus because they were hungry, physically and spiritually. He didn't have to drum up trade. They saw in Him someone who could offer them hope and meet their needs. If one of the purposes of your church is to serve your community, how is this best done where you live?"

Based on more than 20 years of general practice, Dr Pile also challenges health professionals to recognise the benefits of good 'spiritual health', often derived from belonging to churches or other faith communities. These health benefits frequently arise from living a life with purpose and being connected to a wide-ranging group of people.

He explains: "As a society we have never had so much advantage and yet been so disadvantaged by this very same society which we have built for ourselves. We are ignoring our basic needs when it comes to sleep, nutrition, movement, relaxation, relationships and purpose in life.

"We face a rising tide of physical health problems, such as obesity and diabetes, and mental health issues such as loneliness and depression. Our medical model is a broken, disease-based one which is not fit to meet our needs, particularly when it comes to preventing health and wellbeing problems."

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The beginnings of Boots the Chemist

Jesse Boot, the British pharmacist and philanthropist, died 90 years ago, on 13th June 1931. He turned the Boots Company started by his father John – a former agricultural worker – into a chain of chemists branded 'Chemists to the Nation'.

The 1st Baron Trent, as Jesse became in 1929, sold his controlling interest to American investors in 1920, but Boots continues to be a familiar name to all Britons. Ironically John Boot had offered his close friend and business associate John Harston the opportunity of going into business with him, but Harston had felt it was not a good investment.

Jesse Boot was a great benefactor to the City of Nottingham. He gave land for what is now the University of Nottingham and was presented with the Freedom of the City of Nottingham in 1920.

He met his wife, Florence Rowe, in a Wesleyan Chapel in Jersey while he was recuperating from illness. She was also an astute businesswoman, who helped to develop the Boots business, and her home island of Jersey benefited from the couple's generosity. After her husband's death she commissioned the glass artist René Lalique to refit the Anglican church of St Matthew there as a memorial to him

Since your parishioners mostly live in an area of half a

square mile, where their only concern in getting to church is whether to take the underpass, or to risk a dash across the ring road, you may have little understanding of the problems our folk have in travelling our long country lanes to church, especially as we are keeping our social distance from each other.

Several parishioners have decided that they can't possibly share cars even with their own spouses, as in their 15-room homes they have successfully (and in some cases, happily) avoided each other for months. So the lane outside the church has filled up each week with Mercedes nudging Audis, and Land Rovers easing in between Bentleys.

Others arrive on horseback. But they are careless about leaving their horses to graze in the churchyard, and I have had to remind them twice that flowers in memorial vases are not fodder. The horses do help to keep the grass down, but unfortunately our verger now objects to standing outside during Mattins, holding the reins of half a dozen horses. He says it is not part of his job description, which only confirms my view that there is entirely too much fuss these days about having job descriptions at all.

Since he is unable to uncouple the mowing apparatus, the tarmac on his two-mile drive is acquiring interesting patterns. His drive at two miles per hour along narrow lanes means he arrives leading a procession of cars with drivers given the opportunity to exercise the Christian virtue of patience.

Mrs Pendleton, on the other hand, leads a small but select group from the Mothers' Union who are all keen cyclists. They all arrive on a whoosh of fresh air, their hair in total disarray, but with pink cheeks glowing with health. Nobody in church minds sitting near them, as anyone who can manage to peddle an old three-gear bicycle up the hill to our church is most unlikely to be sickening for anything.

Finally, of course, the majority arrive on foot, having negotiated fields, stiles and assorted cattle on the way. The countryside may well praise God, but one does wish they wouldn't bring quite so much of it into church.

"It is like driving on the moon"

Some of our British roads are beginning to resemble "the surface of the moon", according to the RAC. It has recently reported that an average of 52 drivers a day are breaking their cars on potholes and needing to be rescued.

More than 4,000 drivers have needed assistance since January, despite the fact that lockdown has meant many fewer cars on the road.

After years of underfunding and patch-up repair jobs, and despite the fact that councils are currently filling a pothole every 19 seconds, the RAC says that the Government and local councils face an 'enormous task' to get our roads "anything like reasonable" again.
